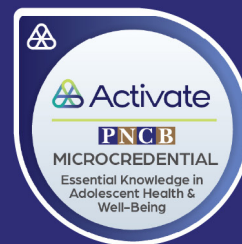

Celebrating Our Journey; Focusing on Our Future

In 1975, visionary pediatric health professionals from the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Association of Faculties of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners, and the National Association of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners united around a shared purpose: to establish rigorous standards for pediatric nursing practice and ensure the highest quality care for our most vulnerable patients. Through their leadership and dedication, they founded the Pediatric Nursing Certification Board, which has since grown into the world’s largest organization dedicated to pediatric nursing certification.

In 2025, PNCB proudly celebrated its 50-year “golden” anniversary—an extraordinary milestone that reflects not only organizational longevity but also the remarkable evolution of pediatric nursing into a highly specialized and essential field. Throughout this commemorative year, PNCB honored its legacy through meaningful gift presentations to partner organizations and other special initiatives. 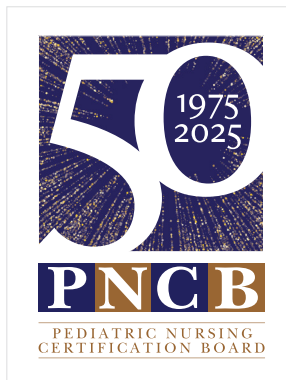

PNCB's 50th Anniversary

Our Start – Our Progress – Our Future

Fifty years ago, a group of visionary pediatric health professionals from the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Association of Faculties of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners, and the National Association of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners came together with a shared purpose: to establish a certification exam and process to recognize the

knowledge of pediatric nurse practitioners, ensuring the highest quality care for our most vulnerable patients. The result became the Pediatric Nursing Certification Board—the largest organization in the world for our nursing specialty.

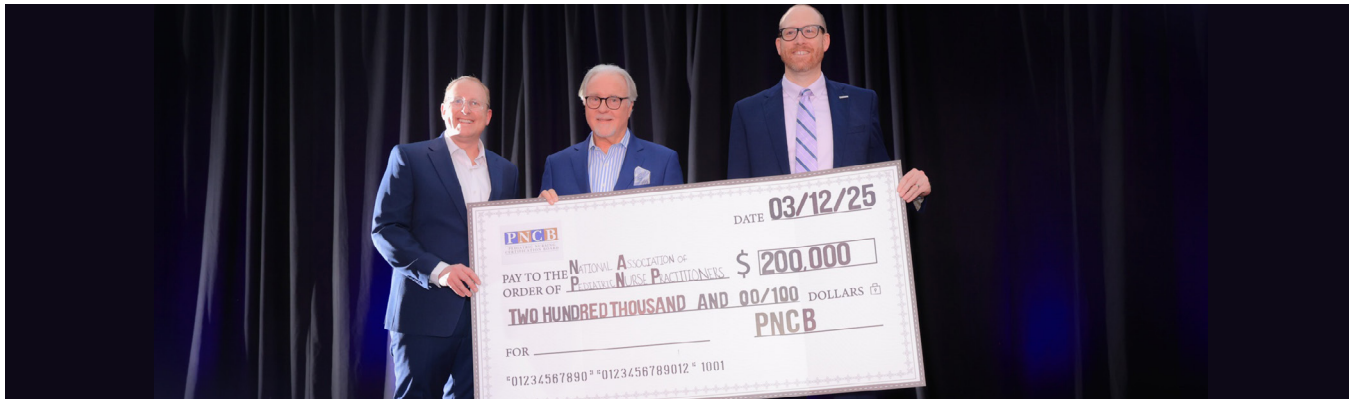
The timeline highlights PNCB's history and the major milestones that have shaped the past five decades.

As part of PNCB's 50th Anniversary recognition, commemorative financial gifts were presented to several founding and longstanding partner organizations.

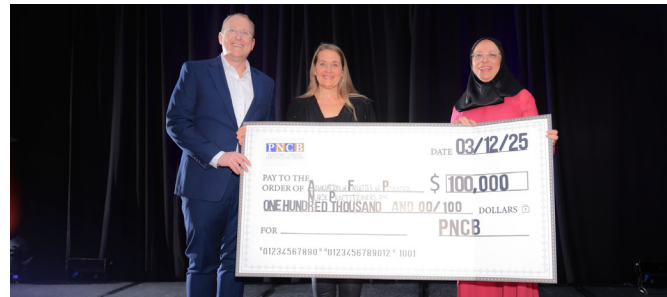

50th Anniversary Special Activities and Celebrations

PNCB's 50-year milestone marks far more than organizational longevity—it celebrates the remarkable evolution of pediatric nursing into a highly specialized, indispensable field within children's health care. Throughout 2025, PNCB honored this golden anniversary with a series of meaningful activities and celebrations for our valued stakeholders, including several initiatives that continued beyond the close of FY25 on September 30, 2025.

Activate Certificate and Microcredential Program Promotion

As part of a special promotional campaign to encourage enrollment in the [Activate certificate and microcredential program](#), PNCB launched a random drawing for new Activate participants. The campaign ran twice—one for each 2025 conference (National Association of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners [NAPNAP] and Society of Pediatric Nurses [SPN])—and awarded the following prizes for each event:

- **Grand Prize:** One winner received conference expenses (registration, hotel, and airfare) and an invitation to PNCB's 50th Anniversary event.
- **Tier 1 Prize:** An Amazon gift card and one PNCB Continuing Education (CE) voucher

PNP Faculty Survey Response Incentive

Fiscal Year 2025 Key Accomplishments

Supporting the goals outlined in the [PNCB 2022–2027 Strategic Plan](#), we are pleased to share the following details about PNCB’s work priorities, along with milestones and accomplishments in fiscal year 2025 which spans from October 1, 2024, to September 30, 2025.

PNCB Work Priorities



Goal 1: *Advance competence and capabilities of nursing professionals who care for children*

1. Advance pediatric nurse competencies including subspecialties through certification, education, and other development programs

- **Published four new Pediatric Update Modules**, including Infrequent Pediatric Chronic Conditions; Acute Care: Pre- and Post- Surgical Management; Pharmacology: Current Concepts 2025; and Primary Care: Current Concepts 2025.



- **Published three new continuing education modules**, including Social Media and Vaccine Hesitancy; Caring for Black Children with Autism and their Families; and Promoting Adolescent Sexual Health in the Digital Age
- **Offered two live webinars**, covering important practice topics like Understanding Anxiety: Recognition, Evaluation, and Treatment; and Expanding the Culture of Safety: Preventing Emotional Harm in Pediatrics.
- **Offered a free CE module** on the Competency Framework for Pediatric Nurse Practitioners.

- **Developed the Cert Now, Pay Later pilot program** for the Pediatric Primary Care Mental Health Specialist (PMHS), a time-limited program to grow and expand access to child mental and behavioral health care.



- **Developed requirements for renewing the Activate microcredential digital badges**, deployed communications to microcredential holders to inform them about microcredential maintenance, and updated PNCB systems to process microcredential and digital badge renewals.

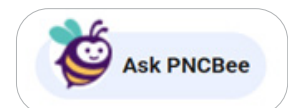


- **Worked on content for a new behavioral health competency certificate and microcredential program** beyond primary care that will launch in FY2026.

2. Explore new technology innovations for user learning

- Conducted an RFP process for a vendor to support the efforts to build an alternative acute care self-study tool.
- Implemented additional software security assurance (SSA) measures to protect PNCB data, communications, and systems.

- Explored technology advancements, including the planned launch in FY2026 of an online 24/7 customer service support “bot” called [PNCBee](#).
- Upgraded staff workstations to Windows 11 in preparation for the migration to a cloud service.



3. Assess and identify national and international market demands and opportunities for PNCB products and services

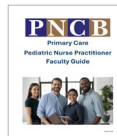
- Signed a joint agreement with the American Nurses Credential Center (**ANCC**) to survey nurse practitioners, including ANCC's Psychiatric Mental Health Nurse Practitioners (**PMHNPs**).
- Launched the survey, collected data, and began conducting analysis of the results with ANCC and ACT to present to the PNCB Board in FY2026.



Goal 2: Cultivate a diverse, equitable, and inclusive PNCB community to enrich the PNCB experience

1. Develop policies, processes, and practices that advance diversity, equity, and inclusion and create a culture of engagement, satisfaction, and resiliency

- Conducted a session on bias at the October 2024 Item Writer Workshop.
- Convened a Critical Care Bias Panel to review CPNP-AC exam items; the panel reported to the Board that no evidence was detected that exam questions were written only for critical care settings.
- Planned the differential item functioning (**DIF**) analysis for all four exams. Worked with a research partner who conducted statistical analyses and identified a subset of items for further review. Subject matter expert (**SME**) panels reviewed the flagged items and found no significant findings or explanations for small variances.
- Published nine issues of the PNP Faculty News Update.
- Completed and sent the *Primary Care Pediatric Nurse Faculty Guide* to all primary care PNP program directors.
- Published a list of suggested resources for primary care PNP testers.
- Collaborated with the Association of Faculty of Pediatric Nurse Practitioners (**AFPNP**) and launched the mentor/mentee survey.
- Hosted the Program Resources/Faculty meeting during the NAPNAP spring conference.
- Hosted a free faculty webinar to discuss changes and challenges to programs related to the new Executive Orders.
- Generated and distributed the Student Exam Performance Reports for each program.
- Maintained and updated content for the AFPNP website.



2. Define value proposition and commitment for employees, certificants, and other key stakeholders

- Completed two internal research projects: identified fairness areas in CE and on the IPN and PNCB websites to review and update; and conducted a deep analysis of potential implications and risk mitigation/management about the impact of 2025 Executive Orders.
- Celebrated PNCB's 50th Anniversary with a 3-day sale on continuing education modules at 50% off the regular price.
- Acknowledged Certificant Appreciation Week by offering savings on PNCB continuing education products.
- Bestowed three practice awards and four conference scholarships in 2025. View the list of awardees and scholarship winners on page 19.



- Marked a milestone in professional association industry leadership when PNCB CEO Sheri Sesay-Tuffour, PhD, FASAE, CAE, ICE-CCP, IOM, was named the Chair-Elect of the American Society of Association Executives and Chair of its Research Foundation.

- Researched fairness and inclusivity training for staff and volunteer item writers, to take place in FY2026.
- Achieved the Great Place to Work® certification for the fourth consecutive year.



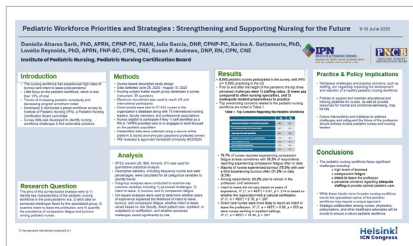
Goal 3: Establish PNCB as a leading voice in pediatric nursing practice

- Conducted data gathering exercises and environmental scans. Identified issues, themes, and items for consideration as part of the global strategy business plan.
- Completed a preliminary Strength-Weaknesses-Opportunities-Threats (SWOT) analysis for expanding PNCB's influence and brand internationally.

2. Expand PNCB community participation at national forums and contributions to publications

- Presented the Pediatric Workforce Priorities and Strategies: Strengthening and Supporting Nursing for the Future e-poster at the International Council of Nurses Congress, June 9–13, 2025, in Helsinki, Finland.
- Published the first article in a three-part journal series in the August 2025 issue of the Journal of Pediatric Nursing, titled “Current Trends and Challenges in the United States of America-Based Pediatric Nursing Workforce”.



- Presented the Challenges and Strategies Affecting the Care of Children and Their Families: A Global Perspective on the Pediatric Nursing Workforce session at the 17th International Family Nursing Conference, June 17–20, 2025, in Perth, Australia.



- Developed and published 11 new pediatric nursing career pathways, including Pediatric Nurse Director, Nurse Consultant, Charge Nurse, Clinical Nurse Educator, Transition to Practice Program Coordinator, Professional Development Specialist, Nurse Manager, Quality Improvement Nurses, School Nurse, Clinical Nurse Specialist, and Nurse Informaticist.

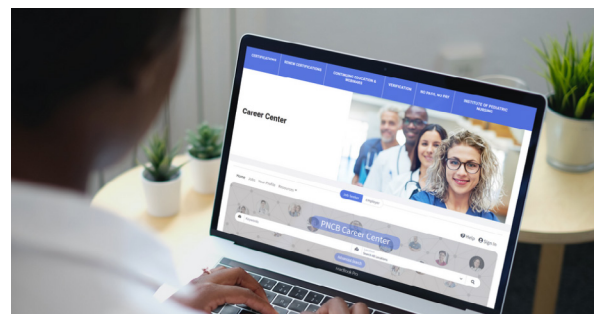

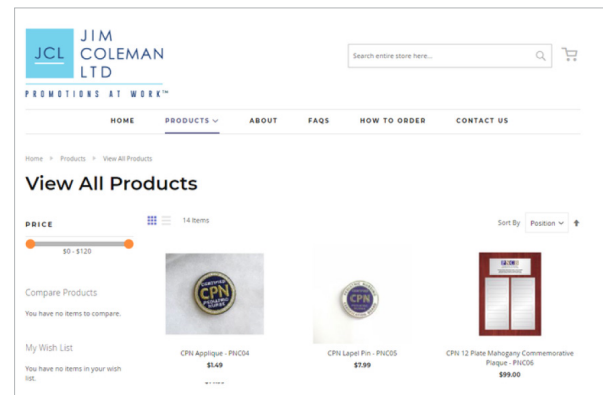
Cert Now, Pay Later Program

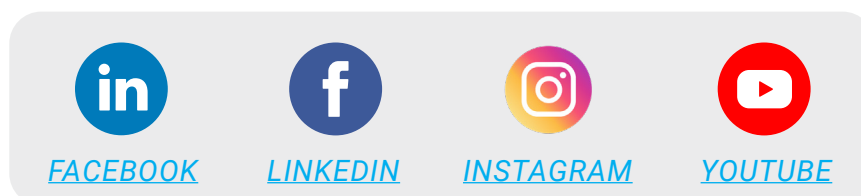

Exam Statistics

PNCB certification is one of the most meaningful and powerful achievements for a pediatric nursing professional. [The Value of PNCB Certification](#) describes how each of the four specialty nursing professionals certified by PNCB play an integral role in increasing access to pediatric-focused health care for patients and their families. The certifications that PNCB offers provide a host of benefits to patients, families, employers, colleagues, the public, and the U.S. health care system overall.

Primary Care Certified Pediatric Nurse Practitioner (CPNP-PC)



- ✔ **22,402** currently certified
- ✔ **98.6%** renewal rate for FY2025
- ✔ **95** PC PNP programs and 26 Dual AC/PC PNP programs
- ✔ **34** CPNP-PCs celebrated 40 years of certification in FY2025

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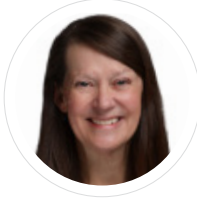
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Institute of Pediatric Nursing (IPN) Committee

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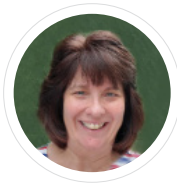
