

Professional Resources for CPNP-PCs and PMHSs Supporting Child & Adolescent Mental Health

Indiana Behavioral Health Access Program for Youth. Indiana University School of Medicine's Department of Psychiatry. Pediatric primary care providers can access this program for guidance from psychiatric specialists.

<u>Maryland Behavioral Health Integration in Pediatric Primary Care.</u> Provides free pediatric mental health support to primary and emergency care providers in addition to training webinars and resources.

<u>Massachusetts Child Psychiatric Access Program</u>. Offers access to Licensed Behavioral Analysts, psychiatric consultation, and webinars. This program is free to all primary care providers.

MC3 Michigan. This program offers support to outpatient healthcare providers in Michigan who manage patients with behavioral and mental health concerns. Statewide services include prescriber consultations, telepsychiatry evaluations, case consultation, school-based consultation, and emergency/crisis services consultation. Psychiatrists are on call at no charge. Monthly free CME modules are available.

National Network of Child Psychiatry Access Programs (NNCPAP). A membership organization with access programs for those treating mental health disorders in primary care in most states. Participating states offer consultation, resources, and referral services. Some states offer additional training. Click on your state to find what is available to you.

Project ECHO Cincinnati. University of Cincinnati Project Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes (ECHO) includes knowledge-sharing through virtual clinics for primary care providers. Project ECHO links expert specialist teams at an academic hub with primary care clinicians and other healthcare professionals in local communities in a hub-and-spoke model. Sessions are held twice monthly.

<u>The REACH Institute</u>. The Institute (Resource for Advancing Children's Mental Health) is national in scope and offers the <u>Patient-Centered Mental Health in Pediatric Primary Care</u> (PPP) program in addition to other educational opportunities for primary care providers managing pediatric mental health in the primary care setting.

<u>Seattle Children's Hospital Wyoming Partnership Access Line</u>. Offers support to pediatric care providers caring for pediatric patients in Wyoming. Support includes medication adjustment or treatment and diagnostic clarification.
